

Expression of Interest Independent Public School Parent Representative

Narangba Valley State High School became an Independent Public School (IPS) in 2013, the year the initiative was launched across Queensland. The IPS model provides state schools and their communities with greater autonomy to make local decisions that best support student learning outcomes.

A key feature of the IPS framework is the School Council, which includes the Principal, an elected Chair, staff and student representatives, and parent and community members. The council plays a vital role in shaping and monitoring the school's strategic direction, distinct from the day-to-day operations managed by the P&C.

We are currently seeking a parent representative to join the School Council. This is a valuable opportunity for parents or carers to have a voice in the school's long-term planning and strategic priorities.

The commitment involves attending one meeting per term, usually outside of business hours, lasting approximately 90 minutes to two hours. Your involvement may include providing input on programs aimed at improving student outcomes or strengthening partnerships with universities and other post-school pathways.

Uniform

A reminder that NVSHS is a uniform school. This is not only important for issues of equity but an essential element of student safety at school. Our uniform allows us to easily identify teachers, visiting workers and students at our school. In the cooler weather that is coming it is important to remind our community that this includes jumpers. There are a range of options at our uniform shop. If students are out of uniform they are to report to the uniform shop before school. This will not incur a consequence. If students are sent to the uniform shop throughout the day due to being in the incorrect unform then this will result in a consequence. A note from home explains a non-uniform item and students will need to change into the correct uniform without penalty.

After consultation with parents and the student body the P and C has added navy blue undershirts to our uniform. These will soon be available at our uniform shop and can also be purchased at Kmart.

I sang at the talent show. I chose to do it because it's my last year at high school and I want to make as many memories as I can! My favourite thing about performing was the crowd and being able to sing.








Ozzy (Year 12)

Community News

The City of Moreton Bay regulates parking or stopping of vehicles on footpaths, bicycle paths, shared paths, dividing strips or nature strips. Please note that vehicles that are parked with two wheels on the footpath/nature strip and two wheels on the road is not considered as a lawful parking practice.

Council is legally obliged to enforce these regulations, and our Proactive School Safety Patrol Program contributes to this enforcement.

During Proactive School Safety Patrols, enforcement of unlawful parking is applied by obtaining photographic evidence and issuing a penalty infringement notice.

Council prefers that vehicle drivers are educated.

Parking around schools

How they work

There can often be queues at drop-off and pick-up areas, near and outside schools.

When using a drop-off and pick-up area you:

- · must use the area like a quick moving
- need to move forward in the queue of vehicles to the signed area
- · can get out of your vehicle to help your children get in and out safely (once in the signed area)
- are only allowed 2 minutes in the are only allowed 2 minutes in the signed area (if you take any longer you may be fined)—if your children are not ready to get straight into your vehicle at pick-up time, you will need to drive round the block and queue to enter the
- should only let your children out once you have pulled into the signed area (it is dangerous to let them out while waiting in a queue).

Parallel parking on a road (except in a median strip parking area)

If a driver does not park in a parking bay, the driver must position the vehicle at least 1 metre from the closest point of any vehicle in front of it and any vehicle behind it and facing the direction of traffic.

Is a vehicle allowed to park near or across a driveway?

Motorists may stop across a driveway to pick up or set down passengers for up to two minutes, provided they do not actually obstruct unattended. Otherwise, it is unlawful,

If a vehicle is parked, unattended, and blocking a property access, then it is parked unlawfully, and the vehicle will be issued an




The vehicle may also be towed by authority of Policelink on 131 444.

How close can a car park to an

Motorists must not stop or park their vehicle

- 20 metres of a signalised intersection, unless otherwise signed, has vellow lines or a dividing white line.
- 10 metres of a non-signalised intersection, unless otherwise signed, has yellow lines or a dividing white line.






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Parking around schools

Cars often park on both sides of the road so only one car can fit through at a time. Is this legal?

Motorists may park on both sides of the road, if there are no signs stating otherwise or no yellow lines. Vehicles must also leave at least three metres of clear roadway between their vehicle and other parked vehicles, dividing strips, traffic islands or unbroken dividing lines.



Can I pull up quickly on the grass or


Motorists must not stop and/or park on:

- footpaths nature strips or two wheels up on nature
- dividing strips, painted islands or traffic

- Motorists <u>must:</u>
 park vehicle on the street
 - ensure all tyres of any vehicle parked on the street are on the road surface abide with other road rules.

Know the signs

In some locations 'No Stopping' and 'No Parking' signage has been installed to assist with traffic flow, ease congestion and enhance safety for road users.
