Why study Humanities?

Humanities subjects offer a whole range of skills that prepare you for lifelong learning and can assist you in performing well in other subject areas. Examples of these skills include: statistical interpretation from real world scenarios; report writing from firsthand data gathering and observations; interpreting and responding to everyday events in the news and what is happening in the community – all of these are invaluable skills in assisting you in your learning and understanding everyday life.

Students will be directed on a path based on their results for Year 9, however negotiation with the Head of Department may lead to a path change as appropriate.


